



RESTORATIVE DENVER

An alternative to the traditional criminal justice system

Restorative Denver is a partnership between The Conflict Center and the Denver District Attorney's Office, offering a **community-based restorative justice** alternative for adults referred through the program.

WHAT IS RESTORATIVE JUSTICE (RJ)?

<u>Restorative justice (RJ)</u> is a response to crime that focuses on addressing and repairing the harm caused by a criminal offense. RJ helps people harmed by crime (victims) feel supported and empowered, and allows the people who caused harm (defendants) to understand the impact of their actions and repair the harm they caused to the greatest extent possible. RJ focuses on making things right and reintegrating participants back into the community with the skills and awareness to prevent future crime.

WHAT WE DO

RESTORATIVE DENVER uses a restorative practice called a <u>community-group conference</u>. After preparation, trained facilitators bring together the person harmed, person who caused harm, community members, and support people to discuss what happened, the resulting harm, who was impacted, and how the defendant can repair the harm. The conference results in a contract that the person who caused harm must complete in order for the charges to be dismissed and the case sealed.
